Having been involved in the running of a family-owned restaurant in the area for the past 30 years, I am enthusiastic and prepared to contribute my knowledge to the Culinary Arts program. I hope to give students the power to take charge of their educational futures by enabling them to be more committed and engaged in their learning.*

After working as a special education teacher for almost 20 years, Culinary Arts provides me the flexibility to guide students to be a creative team member, who enjoys learning new things; together with hands-on training and experiences to prepare for a career in the field. This school year I look forward to giving students the opportunity to showcase their creativity through food and helping my students to love learning for a lifetime.



Mr. ZaQ Zrust comes to the ACC from Minnesota. Mr. Zrust states the following about his relocation to the Illinois Valley: *After my family (wife and 4 kids) and I relocated to the Illinois Valley last fall from the Twin Cities metro area (my wife is originally from La Moille, IL) I wasn't sure where I would end up teaching, and honestly felt pretty lost as I was in love with my last school. However, after just a few weeks, I can confidently say I've never been more excited about a class as I am about our IVEO program. After spending over a decade on the road as a touring musician, manager, and tech, and running my own successful businesses with my*

wife (a couple still going strong), I came to teaching as a second career, and traditionally have taught in the Social Studies department (AP World and US History, Sociology, Human Geography.) One question I struggled with at times with students was when they would ask things like, "when am I ever going to need to know who the leader of 3rd century China was when I leave school?" While I would give those types of inquiries my best responses, they weren't always wrong to ask. Students want to know their time and efforts in the classroom are going to be useful to them when they move on, and I can confidently say, my class offers exactly that in spades. I am beyond excited to be a part of the LP and ACC family, and can't wait to see what the future holds.

Mr. Zrust concludes his expectations for the 2021-22 school year with his philosophy on education: *"None of us are as smart as all of us!" Every single day of my teaching career this comes into play. It doesn't matter how many years of experience someone has in one field or another, or how many degrees they may acquire in college. My students are told on day one, you can ALWAYS learn something new from someone else. Never discount another's experience or perspective, especially when you have the opportunity to spend time with people that come from different backgrounds from yours.*

Computer Repair Certifies and Incorporates

ACC Repair and Programming Students Start Their Own Business

While other students eagerly greeted the end of a trying school year, six students in Mr. Zac Koesler's Computer Repair class decided that they needed about 40 more hours of intensive study. That hard work paid off in multiple ways.



As a way to help make up learning gaps that occurred during remote instruction, and to offer students a tangible takeaway from the course they had just finished, Mr. Koesler offered a summer workshop that focused on earning the Computer Repair A+ Certification. Six students took him up on this challenge and put in roughly 40 hours of extra work to prepare for the grueling two stage exam. That hard work paid off, as all six students passed both exams and earned their A+ certification. Those six students represented three different ACC schools (LPHS, Princeton, and La Moille).

Additionally, as an extension of their love for all things computing, three of the summer workshop students have set up their own company known as Starvel Industries. It is a company dedicated to offering computer/gaming repair as well as 3-D printing services.

In a previous class student Josh Grygiel started his own web-design and programming business. It seems the computer aficionados have quite the entrepreneurial spirit.


